Suzuki Bokushi 鈴木牧之(1770-1842)





- Born and lived in Shiozawa, a rural post town (population: 811 in 1755), Echigo Province
- A member of the rural elite
- A pawnbroker and landlord (45 → 100 koku)
- An amateur haikai poet, painter and writer
- Built great correspondence networks with urban and provincial literati
- Author (with Santō Kyōzan) of Hokuetsu seppu (Snow Country Tales) published in Edo (Part I, 1837 and Part II, 1842)







Literacy training

Bokushi's education

Aged 8 – 13 (1777-82)

Basic education for reading and writing (手習い) at Daiunji (大運寺)

Textbooks: 今川古状、四書、古文、唐詩選

Aged 16 - ? (1785 - ?)

Learning Chinese poetry from a priest at the Untōan (雲洞庵) temple, a local intellectual centre led by the head priest Kaiun 海雲 (1738-1827), an Edo-educated intellectual.

Communication over a distance

Haikai networks

e.g. Contest organized by Bokushi in 1800

•Judges: 10 haikai masters in Edo, Kyoto, Osaka, etc.

•Entry: 4,102 verses from Echigo, Musashi, Kōzuke, Shinano, Mutsu, Ise provinces and city of Edo, etc.

Holograph (筆蹟) collection boom

'I have now collected letters and cards from around 600 people, including dignitaries and distinguished priests' – Bokushi's letter, 1836

Directories of scholars and artists

e.g. 『江戸当時諸家人名録』(*Who's who* in Edo) pub. 1815, rev. 1820

Mail system

e.g. 15.4 days on average from the date of Bokushi's writing to the date of delivery to Kyōzan (18 letters, 1829-1834)

• Focus on "inaka 田舎" as a subject

e.g. Shinra Banshō (aka. Morishima Churyō), Inaka shibai 『田舎芝居』, pub. 1787; Ikku, Tokaidōchū hizakurige 『東海道中膝栗毛』, pub. 1802-14, Zoku hizakurige 『続膝栗毛』, pub. 1810-22

- Shift from urban witty tales to spectacle narratives:
 from sharebon洒落本/kibyōshi黄表紙 to gōkan合巻/yomihon読本
 e.g. Kyōden, Chūshin suikoden 『忠臣水滸伝』, pub. 1799; Bakin, Nansō
 Satomi hakkenden 『南総里見八犬伝』, pub. 1814-42
- Popular writers' ambition to do scholarly work: kōshō zuihitsu考証随筆

e.g. Kyōden, Kottōshū 『骨董集』, pub. 1815; Bakin, Gendō hōgen 『玄同放言』, pub. 1818

Bokushi's relationships with Edo bunjin

義ヲ以交るを上とす。言を以まじハるをその次トス。食を以交るを又その次トス。財利を以交るを下とす。君とわれハ言を以交るもの敷。
The supreme is the relationship bound by "integrity"; the next type is one connected by "the word"; then comes one built on "meals"; the worst is one motivated by "money". You and I are those connected by "the word", aren't we? — letter from Bakin to Bokushi, dated 1818/5/17

鈴木牧之は越後塩澤の豪家にて野生四十余年来の旧識に候。元来俗人ながら俳諧を好み画も出来候。第一名聞を好む癖あり。 Suzukí Bokushí ís a rích man ín Shíozawa, Echigo. He has been ín contact with me for more than forty years. He ís a commoner but líkes writing haíkaí and also good at drawing. He ís a fame seeker, though. – letter from Bakin to Tonomura Jōsai in Matsusaka, 1837/4/22
